

The speakers will focus on the crucial role of strategic litigation in raising awareness about the impact of hate crimes on victims, establishing new individual rights for them, and broadening their access to justice. Speakers will examine the challenges and opportunities in using strategic litigation to shape environments and conditions that improve the support available to hate crime victims. By selecting cases that can set legal precedents, strategic litigation can strengthen the legal protection of victims of hate crimes, increase accountability, and foster societal and systemic change.

The webinar is aimed at experts and professionals working to protect and support hate crime victims. This includes legal professionals working in civil society organisations, human rights institutes, Ombudsperson institutions, litigation lawyers and other human rights defenders, prosecutors and judges, alongside researchers in the field of hate crime and hate crime victim support and specialist support providers working on hate crime victim protection.
